About People in Need Zambia

People in Need opened its office in Western Province in 2017. Since then, it has been working to improve nutrition, health, food security, and livelihoods for vulnerable groups while also promoting good governance by engaging Civil Society Organizations in local and national advocacy initiatives. In the past, PIN Zambia has provided humanitarian aid and early recovery support to refugees from the Democratic Republic of Congo and has helped prevent and mitigate the impact of COVID-19 by improving WASH practices in rural and urban communities and health facilities. Currently, PIN is implementing a nutrition emergency project to reduce morbidity and mortality among children under 5 and pregnant and lactating women in response to the drought disaster in the Western Province. Additionally, PIN has been implementing projects related to biogas technology and biochar to improve food security for smallholder farmers.

Project Introduction

Background

Western province has the highest rate of poverty in Zambia with 73% classified as extremely poor. Most households are dependent on subsistence and rain-fed agriculture production with very limited diversification. In addition, only 5% of rural population in Zambia have access to electricity and only 16% have access to clean fuels for cooking. Lack of alternative livelihood opportunities and energy poverty coupled with lack of awareness, capacities and inadequate formal and informal management structures manifest in forest degradation and poor rangeland practices. Impacts of climate change further exacerbate damage to the unique ecosystem of the Barotse Floodplain, which serves as the main source of livelihoods for local communities. Unsustainable rangeland practices such as human induced wildfires coupled with overgrazing and presence of fauna invasive species have serious effects on the ecosystem of the Barotse Floodplain. Furthermore, common alien invasive plants such as Mimosa pigra also threaten endangered and vulnerable species once more widespread in the Barotse Floodplain.

Mongu and Limulunga districts face all of the main problems described above. The districts were selected to complement other PIN and WWF interventions while considering the proximity of the Barotse Floodplain. The selection was further conducted through a consultative process with the government departments during the project design stage.

Project Brief

The Enhancing Livelihood Opportunities through Ecosystem Protection project is funded by Jersey Overseas Aid (JOA) and Czech Aid and is being implemented by People in Need in partnership with World-Wide Fund for Nature (WWF). The project targets the unique socio-ecosystem of the Barotse Floodplain in Western Zambia and is being implemented in the districts of Mongu and Limulunga. The project promotes an integrated approach aimed at enhancing self-reliance of local communities while preserving the unique ecosystem of the Barotse Floodplain. The intervention will leverage nature-based solutions and focus on empowerment of local actors. As a result, conservation will become a livelihood potential in itself and will bring socio- economic benefits to the most vulnerable and deprived communities while also protecting the local environment.

Overall Objective

- To contribute to the conservation of the local ecosystem, restoration of biodiversity and alleviation of poverty in Barotse Floodplain of Western Province.
- To create alternative and climate resilient livelihood opportunities for smallholder farmers through strengthened management of local ecosystem, development of alternative value chains and enhanced access to clean energy.

Key Components

Rangeland management

- Establishment of Rangeland Management Committees in cooperation with the Community-led with the Ministry of Livestock and Fisheries and their capacity building in sustainable pasture and ecosystem management, management of wildfires, animal welfare, entrepreneurial skills and financial literacy.
- Development and implementation of rangeland management plans supported by participatory mapping, satellite imagery processing and GIS mapping.
- Community-led conservation campaign on removing Mimosa pigra to safeguard local ecosystem and increase area for sustainable grazing.

Forestry management

- Establishment of community forest management groups in cooperation with the Forestry Department and their capacity building in sustainable forestry management, climate-resilient agroforestry practices and sustainable exploitation of non-timber products..
- Development of alternative value chains for non-timber forest products and support to small businesses.

Access to clean energy

- Promotion of alternative fuel-saving energy solutions for cooking through advocacy, social and behavior change campaign and complementary action to ongoing fuel-saving energy interventions.
- Development of local market for biogas technology, linking small-scale farmers with established financial schemes and targeted training.

Target Groups

- Smallholder farmers: Through participation in rangeland committees and community forest management groups, target farmers will directly benefit from improved capacities in rangeland and forestry management, enhanced livelihood opportunities, development of alternative value chains and strengthened access to clean energy. This will contribute to enhanced food security and climate resilience of smallholder farmers and reduce poverty levels, with specific focus on female farmers through a gender-responsive approach.
